Course Calendar Description (from the 2024/2025 University Calendar)

Derivative instruments and their use for speculation and hedging. Analysis of different markets where instruments trade, and their characteristics. Pricing models highlighted to determine how individuals and corporations can better manage risk; exotics and newer innovations.

Course Description:

This introductory course will focus on options, futures and forwards, and swaps. We will examine trading strategies and risk hedging using these derivatives. We will also consider pricing these derivatives accordingly.
