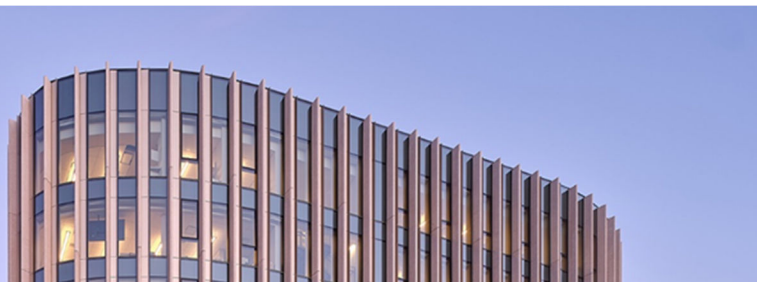

Concepts, models, and managerial issues in planning, designing, operating and controlling systems across supply chains for the provision of goods and services. Emphasis on basic ideas and tools.

Instructor's Course Description:

This course introduces students to the concepts, technologies, and business applications of **Industry 4.0** and the **Industrial Internet of Things (IIoT)**. Students will explore how emerging technologies such as Internet of Things (IoT), cyber-physical systems, cloud computing, big data analytics, artificial intelligence, machine learning, and smart manufacturing are transforming industrial operations and business models. This course shows how Industry 4.0 employs the IoT and AI technologies to achieve self-thinking supply chains. It demonstrates the use of Industry 4.0 in the transformation to smart industries. Lectures, demonstrations and hands-on exercises allow students to design, deploy and manage custom IoT solutions.

Course Learning Objectives:

1. Explain the fundamental concepts of Industry 4.0 and the Industrial Internet of Things (IIoT).
2. Analyze how Industry 4.0 technologies improve manufacturing, supply chain management
3. Evaluate digital transformation strategies and business models that support the adoption of Industry 4.0 technologies in organizations.

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4. Identify the opportunities, challenges, and risks associated with Industry 4.0 implementation
 5. Interpret industrial data and analytical results
 6. Communicate Industry 4.0 concepts and digital transformation recommendations effectively through professional reports and presentations.
 7. Develop industry 4 solution for a simulated problem

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Methods of Evaluation / Grading Scheme

1. Quizzes (2 * 10% = 20%)

The objective of the quizzes is to encourage students to improve their critical thinking and analytical skills. At the end of the class, you will have time to take quiz. This quiz is written and individual and cannot be done in groups. These sessions are totally in-person and the absence students will lose their mark.

2. Assignment (30%)

This assignment should be done in group 2 or 3. All details will be available in the

assignment rubric.

3. Final project and proposal (30%+20% = 50%)

All students should do a final project and upload it by the deadline. This project is not individually and can be done in group 2 or 3. Each group should prepare a proposal of their project and present it in the last session of the class. All details will be available in the project rubric.

4. Bonus (10%)

Students are not obligated to participate in the class except for class with Quizzes and presentations. However, at the end of each session, a class activity will be done and uploaded to the Brightspace. The objective of the class activities is to encourage studying the course material on a regular basis. The students who attend the class and do their class activity inside the class will receive bonus. This class activity should be done in group 2 or 3. The group should be the same as the group for final project.

5. Most of the important parts of the textbook will be covered in the lecture. However, it is the responsibility of the students to read the entire textbook.

Use of Generative Artificial Intelligence

You are free to use any Generative AI Tool for your final projects and assignments but not for Quizzes. However, you bear responsibility for all your submissions. If you use GenAI for class assignments (class activities and quizzes) you will lose the grade. Since Generative AI tools may plagiarize from other sources on the web, you should be extremely careful while using them. They are also prone to producing incorrect information with exaggerated confidence. All prior work should be rigorously cited, and any plagiarism will be considered an academic offence. Moreover, the way to use AI has separate grades which will be explained in the rubric completely.

Preparation and Participation:

This course is delivered in person and requires students to actively engage during lectures, group discussions, and case-based activities. Students are expected to come to each class well prepared. Active participation includes contributing thoughtfully to class discussions, engaging in problem-solving exercises, working collaboratively during group tasks, and asking relevant questions that deepen understanding.
