Course Description:

The course begins with an examination of the principles and theory which underlie the practice of auditing financial statements. In particular, concepts of management assertions, audit objectives, evidence, materiality and risk, internal control, audit planning, and reporting are examined and discussed. The course also examines auditing as a professional activity, including topics such as professional judgement, ethics, legal liability, and the responsibilities of auditors to society. Other assurance engagements are also addressed.

- 7. Critique developments in the profession
- 8. Compare financial statement audits and other assurance engagements

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

How to do Well in this Course:

This course covers a lot of material. In order to learn the material you need to *review* the content and *engage* with it by completing as many practice problems as you can.

You may choose to review the course content by a combination of any of the following: reading the recommended textbook chapters, reviewing the publisher's slides posted on Brightspace, referring to listed CPA Canada reference materials, etc.

In order to encourage you to engage with the material and practice applying your knowledge, 20% of your final grade can be earned by completing homework assignments in MyLab. There are 11 assignments and your mark will be calculated based on your best 8. You have three attempts to answer each question and although the questions range in complexity they are all worth 1 mark each. The purpose of the grades is simply to provide you with a reward for keeping up with the material, which will be the biggest driver of your success on Assignments 1 and 2, and on the final exam. Think of it as getting credit each week for completing recommended practice problems.

There are no weekly lectures or Zoom meetings for this asynchronous course. It is expected that you spend that time reviewing materials (approx. 1-2 hours) and completing the problems in MyLab (approx. 1-2 hours).

Brightspace:

Brightspace will be used in this course. It is critical to use this learning tool on a regular basis. We will be using Brightspace as follows:

- To communicate with students on regular basis (e-mail, announcements, etc.)
- To host weekly summaries of recommended readings, deliverables, etc.
- To post notes of an administrative nature or updates to the course outline, if required
- To provide a link to MyLab, where homework will be completed

Late Coursework

To ensure fairness for all students, penalties will be applied to late assignments: Failure to submit an assignment on time will result in a penalty of ten (10) percentage points per day up to a maximum of three days late. For example, an assignment that would normally merit a grade of 80% would receive a grade of 60% if submitted two days late. Assignments will not be accepted at all after the third day and a grade of 0% will be awarded. Assignments are available well in advance and can be worked on at any time during the course up until the deadline. Do not wait until the last minute to attempt or submit the assignment.

The exception to this policy is the MyLab weekly homework. No late weekly homework submissions will be accepted because the solutions become available once the deadline has passed.

The MindBridge AI Auditor platform is an intuitive platform that empowers auditors to analyze financial data more efficiently, while augmenting human capacity to uncover errors and intentional misstatements in the data. The program will include hands-on case studies, where students have access to the Ai Auditor program to perform required analysis. Case studies are focused on fraud detection analysis, while reinforcing AI auditing principles. The program will require students to complete three case studies and one assignment. These cases are expected to be completed on an individual basis. Upon the completion of the assignment and receipt of grades, the student will receive a certificate of completion of the program.

Final Examination

A final examination will take place during the university scheduled final exam period. The final exam is cumulative. University policy with respect to examinations will be strictly adhered to. Supplemental and grade-raising examinations are not available.
