Course Calendar description from the 2020/2021 University calendar:

Fundamentals of financial accounting. Techniques used to measure business transactions, preparation of financial statements, recording and valuation of assets, liabilities and equities. Precludes additional credit for BUSI 5004 (no longer offered).

Course Description:

ACCT 5001 is a financial accounting course. Accounting has often been called "the language of business". This course is designed to help you begin to understand and communicate in this language - something that is important for all users of accounting information, not just preparers of it.

The content of this course covers financial accounting concepts, principles, and analysis. The course should also help you gain an appreciation of the uses of accounting information and an awareness of its limitations. The course major focus is on the understanding, analysis, and use of financial statement information for business decisions.

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Recognize the relevance financial information have on decisions;
2. Apply basic accounting concepts and principles;
3. Prepare basic financial statements;
4. Apply accounting measurements and reporting and their limitations;
5. Analyze and interpret financial accounting information

Quizzes (6 quizzes one each week – 5% each)

There will be 6 quizzes for the topics covered. The quizzes consist of answering 5 multiple choice questions and are submitted through cuLearn.

The best 5 quizzes count towards your final grade. You have 45 minutes to attempt each quiz. Deadlines are firm and there will be no make up quizzes for missed attempts.

Assignments (3 at 10% each)

The assignments include short cases and problems posted to CuLearn. The assignments are built and accessible using the Kimmel text in the WileyPlus website. They are completed **individually**. Students are expected to submit their assignment via WileyPlus CuLearn before class. If it is not submitted on the due date, it will be considered late and subject to a **100% PENALTY. MAKE-UP ASSIGNMENTS ARE NOT PROVIDED**. Plagiarism will result in a zero grade for all involved.

Final exam (45%)

The final exam will test technical and theoretical aspects. The exam will cover the whole course. You must achieve at least a combined 45% grade on the final exam to pass this course.

Students will receive an exam and expected to respond with a written response. The exam will be time limited.
