COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES:

This introductory course provides students with an overview of the Canadian business environment, the functional areas within a business and introduces skills needed to be an effective employee and manager. Students will learn to recognize and analyze an organization as an integrated entity. This course introduces students to the fundamentals of Problem Solving, Business Communications, Marketing, Entrepreneurship, Operations Management, Management Information Systems, Accounting, Finance, Management and Human Resources. Upon completion, students will be able to demonstrate an understanding of the business concepts as a foundation for introduction into the business environment

List the stages of the life cycle of a product; Identify inputs and outputs; and the core functions in production management. Explain why quality control and total quality management are important elements of production and their impact on products or services
Explain the role of social responsibility and business ethic in a business environment.	 Understand what it means to practice good business ethics. List the factors that influence ethical decisions Discuss the role of business in protecting the natural environment
Develop basic business communication and professional skill-sets.	 List the major components of a communication strategy and its importance to all stakeholders. Review various management reports and financial statements that would best communicate the companies positions. Apply the stages of team development and examine why conflict may arise and strategies that can be used to resolve them.
