Discussion of the concepts of asset valuation and income measurement underlying the preparations and interpretation of financial statements.

Precludes additional credit for BUSI 1003 and BUSI 1004.

Prerequisite(s): <u>BUSI 1800</u>, or enrolment in Statistics with Concentration in Actuarial Science B.Math Honours.

Course description

BUSI 1001 is the first accounting course in a two-course sequence (with BUSI 1002). This financial accounting course is an integrated introduction to accounting principles and practices. Accounting has often been called "the language of business". This course is designed to help you begin to understand and communicate in this language - something that is important for users of accounting information - not just preparers of it. The course should also help you gain an appreciation for the uses of accounting information and the limitations inherent in accounting information.



Learning Outcomes

In order to pass this course, students should be able to demonstrate ability to:

- a) Understand and prepare financial statements.
- b) Outline the purpose, use, and limitations of accounting measurements and reporting.
- c) Critically analyze and interpret accounting information for decision purposes.

Successful completion of this course will also give you a solid foundation for additional study and careers in business.

The quizzes consist of answering 5 multiple choice questions (with the exception of Quiz # 2 which will consist of 10 questions) and are to be submitted through Brightspace. *Note that Quiz # 2 is worth double.

You will be allowed two attempts at each quiz. You have 45 minutes to attempt each quiz (except for Quiz 2 which is 90 minutes). The best of the two attempt grades will count as your quiz grade. Midterm Simulation (5%)

The *mid-term simulation* will be available on Brightspace on June 9th and must be completed by Sunday, June 16th, 11:59p.m. The marking will be based on attempt only and on whether you are correctly using Excel when preparing the spreadsheet for the problems (i.e. using separate spreadsheets for each problem, etc...). The objective is to make sure that you are comfortable with the midterm setup in Brightspace and that you know how to answer the questions.

Midterm Exam (25%)

The *mid-term examination* will be centrally scheduled through exam services and held during the week June 21-27 (which can include Friday evening, Saturday or Sunday). An announcement will be made in brightspace as soon as a date is determined. The duration of the mid-term will be 1.5 hours.



The mid-term will cover chapters 1-5. It will be written <u>online in Brightspace and e-proctored</u> <u>using the Co-Mas software</u>.

<u>e-Proctoring</u>: The University's e-proctoring system (**CoMaS**) will be used to administer the midterm exam. Details about this system and your requirements will be laid out well before the exams so that you are ready. You can find more information at https://carleton.ca/ses/e-proctoring/.

The minimum computing requirements for e-proctoring service are as follows:

Note: Tablets, Chromebooks and Smartphones are not supported at this time. Windows-based tablets are not supported at this time.

You will receive clear instructions on how to install and test Co-Mas **one week** before the mid-term. Long used by Carleton, Co-Mas is not invasive AI-based software, but tools focused on delivering support, transparency, and flexibility.

It is the responsibility of each student to instal and test CoMas <u>before</u> the midterm date. If CoMas is not working properly the day of the midterm, a penalty will be applied. More information will be provided in Brightspace.

If a student misses the midterm, they need to reach out to the professor as soon as possible to provide a valid reason. Possibilities of writing a deferred test or adding the midterm weight to the final exam will be discussed.

The mid-term will be marked by the teaching assistants and myself. We follow a rigorous quality control process that reasonably assures that the grade awarded on your mid-term is fair. However, no system is 100% error-free, so it is possible that you may wish to call into question a grade that has been awarded. If this happens, please let me or the TAs know within 7 days from the date the midterm solutions were made available to you.

Final Exam (45%)

The **final examination** will be held in the regular examination period (**August 17-23**), it is closed-book. The exam will be written online in **Brightspace and will be e-proctored**. The duration of the exam will be 3 hours. The final examination will cover the whole course. You need to obtain a minimum grade of 40% on the final exam to pass this course.



Student's Responsibilities with regards to deadlines

It is your responsibility to ensure that you meet (1) the quiz deadlines above, (2) the mid-term date and time, and (3) the final exam date and time. It's as easy as entering these in your calendar on your smart phone or paper agenda. To perform well in this course, you must spend time answering extra problems and checking the answers to test your understanding. To maximize your learning, you should make an honest attempt at the question before peeking at the solution. Simply reading a question and then turning to the solution right away is next to useless. You will find that there is likely to be a direct correlation between the number of problems you prepare, your diligence in keeping up with the course content and your course grade.

You are provided with detailed solutions to all of the problems in the textbook. In addition, some of the problems are identified with a video icon (\square). These problems are accompanied with a video that takes up the problem in detail.

Teaching Assistants and Support

Teaching assistants are available to support you throughout this course. They will answer any questions posted to the Discussion Forums in a timely manner.

Videos

FINAL THOUGHTS

For many students, this course is a difficult one. Part of this difficulty stems from a challenging subject matter, but the biggest difficulty comes from failing to devote enough effort to working with the material. Like calculus and other courses where no two problems look alike, financial accounting requires that you practice working with it—over and over.

These observations have a number of implications for you and I. First, you will have to spend many hours during, and after watching the videos working on the course. This course contains lots of new vocabulary and concepts, so don't be afraid to ask the TA's for clarification or examples. After watching the videos, you should review both your notes and the suggested solutions to the assigned problems to improve your understanding. It is absolutely essential that you keep up with the assigned reading and end-of-chapter problems.

In exchange for your hard work, you can expect the same from me. For example, expect the TA and I to enthusiastically answer any and all of your questions. Expect us to provide timely feedback on how well you are understanding the material.

In past years, many students struggled in this course mainly because they underestimated the time and commitment required to be successful. This is an elective course for most students so when times get tough, for example when term work and exams start piling up for your major courses of study, BUSI 1001 takes a back seat often resulting in poor marks.

To be successful in this course, you need to answer yes to the following questions:

- Am I interested in business and accounting?
- Can I devote around 7 hours consistently every week to this course?

If your answer is NO to either of the questions, you should seriously rethink your decision to take BUSI 1001.

Ensure you watch the <u>Introductory Video</u> to the course before you do anything else. This video will go over the course outline and provide you with tips to allow you to be successful in this course.
