Course Calendar description from the 2020/2021 University calendar:

Capital investment and financing decisions in the context of risk and return tradeoffs. Primary and derivative securities, and their role in risk management. Mergers, corporate restructuring, the theory of principal-agent relationships, and financial planning, forecasting, and control.



Course Objectives:

The topics covered in BUSI 2504 will be extended, exposing students to a broad range of material pertaining to Business Finance and Financial Management. Topics covered include: (i) risk /return analysis, (ii) capital budgeting under uncertainty, (iii) capital structure analysis, (iv) dividend policy, (v) lease financing, (vi) mergers and acquisitions, and (vii) risk management using derivatives, such as options.

Students will learn principles for making sound decisions about financing (obtaining funds) and investment (using funds) when facing an environment with risk and uncertainty.

The overarching goal of this course is to teach students how to apply an approach to financial decisions that uses expectations about after-tax cash flows, while accounting for uncertainty in the available information.

Important learning objectives for the course are to teach students:

- Important details of financial management that could not be covered in 2504
- That risk and uncertainty can be managed as part of running a business
- To apply discounted cash flows techniques as a general and powerful tool in understanding business decisions

This course makes frequent use of quantitative techniques and models. **Review 2504 notes!**

Sample Problems – finance cannot be learned without solving problems. To ensure that you understand the material, sample problems will be given. These problems will NOT be graded. However, it is strongly recommended that you try solving the assigned problems as they will help you in preparation for quizzes and exams. Group work on the sample problems is encouraged.

Class Format

The majority of the classes will be comprised of lectures and the completion of sample problems.

Notes on Examinations and Quizzes:

Each quiz will cover only material covered during the week it is administered. Quizzes must be completed by midnight on the Sunday following the release of the weekly course material. Students will have 30 minutes to complete each quiz. Best three of the four quizzes will be used to calculate the final grade for quiz.

The **term test** will be a two-hour test comprised of 30 multiple choice questions held in the week indicated. Students who are unable to write the term test because of a serious illness/emergency or other circumstances beyond their control, and who provide appropriate supporting documentation, may request accommodation. The instructor will use the best efforts to provide a make-up term test for eligible students in the week following the originally scheduled term test.

The **final exam** will be a three-hour test comprised of 50 multiple choice questions held during the usual exam period. Material covered during the entire course is eligible to be addressed in the final exam.

Students will have access to all course materials during the exams.
