Pre-requisites & precluded Courses: BUSI 2002 with a grade of C- or higher.

Course Calendar description from the <u>2023/2024 University calendar</u>: Accounting problems associated with business combinations, with attention to the preparation of consolidated financial statements. Discussion may extend to financial reporting and diversified companies, reorganizations, etc. Selection of topics may vary from year to year.

Course Description and Learning Outcomes:

Discussion of accounting issues and problems associated with business combinations, long-term intercorporate investments, diversified operations, foreign operations and not-for-profit organizations. Equity accounting, preparation of consolidated financial statements, and foreign currency translation are given particular attention.

Students will be expected to demonstrate the following learning outcomes:

- Understand, interpret, apply and critically evaluate the accounting treatment for:
 - Non-controlled investments;
 - Control investments (wholly owned, and non-wholly owned);
 - Joint arrangements;
 - Foreign currency transactions and translations; and,
 - Non-profit organizations

LATE ASSIGNMENTS:

MIDTERM EXAM:

The Midterm Exam will cover Weeks 1 to 5. The Midterm Exam will take place inperson, on-campus, on February 16, 2024 (held during the regular class time – the location is to be determined). The duration of the Midterm Exam is 2 hours. The exam will test both technical and conceptual aspects of the course. If you cannot write the exam for any reason (death in the family, illness, etc) you may provide me with supporting documentation and the weight may be moved to the Final Exam. There is no deferred Midterm Exam.

FINAL EXAM:

The Final Exam will cover the entire course and will be held in-person during the regular final examination period (April 13, 2024 to April 25, 2024; Date/Time to be determined). The Final Exam will take place in-person, on-campus, and can be scheduled anytime from April 13 to April 25, including Friday evenings, Saturdays or Sundays. The duration of the exam will be 3 hours. The Final Exam will test both technical and conceptual aspects of the course. You must obtain a minimum grade of 40% on the Final Exam to pass this course.
