## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Business Ethics is a core course examining the impact of corporate decisions on society. Corporate social responsibility (CSR), sustainability and governance will be analyzed from a variety of stakeholder perspectives and standards of business ethics in a global context. The primary objective of this course is to develop a comprehensive understanding of the impact of corporate behaviour on the firm's stakeholders. The theoretical basis for specifying the ethics of business will be examined and applied to a variety of practical and significant problems faced by organizations.

# **Class participation 15%**

# Personal Incident paper 10 %

For this assignment, you are required to identify an ethically questionable behavior or decision that you have encountered (preferably in your work or school life), and describe briefly the ethical issues and basic ethical principles associated with that behavior or decision. This assignment should be a maximum of three pages in length.

# In – Class case analysis 15 %

This is an individual case analysis assignment. Students will be given a case and questions related to the case. You are supposed to use all what you have learnt in this class to write up the answers.

# In- Class Test – 30 %

There will be an in- class s held during regularly scheduled class time. You must be present to write this exam or present a doctor's note (or other valid explanation) to explain your absence. If you miss the test, you will have to take a make- up test within a week. Tests will be on all materials covered in class, lecture slides, chapters outlined in syllabus, and assigned readings
