Pre-requisites: 4th year standing

Course Description: This seminar course is built around high-profile guest lectures, class discussions and group assignments evaluating the role of business in environmental problems. The course will pose challenging, "big picture" environmental sustainability questions and encourage critical and creative exchanges between guest speakers and students. The course will use speakers to delve into current conundrums of the role of business models to mitigate harm and adapt to change in our search for solutions to pressing environmental issues.

Course Approach: This seminar course is designed to be interactive engaging students, speakers and instructors in dialogue about the challenges and opportunities across industries as companies embrace and expand their environmental sustainability initiatives and innovations. The aim is to focus on practical business application of the circular economy.

Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Increase understanding of responsible business management concepts e.g. triple bottom line, sustainable corporate governance, sustainable development;
- 2. Enhance understanding of the current and pressing environmental challenges businesses and society face and possible solutions.
- 3. Increase understanding of roles and responsibilities for business leaders to define and address challenging environmental sustainability issues;
- 4. Network with business leaders to understand management processes and perspectives on environmental sustainability;



5. Develop broad knowledge of priorities and best practices in environmental sustainability for businesses

Course Requirements & Methods of Evaluation (including due dates):

Evaluation of this course will be based on student participation (e.g. directly engaging with speakers, the instructors and each other), assignments based on challenges posed by speakers, summaries of speaker comments/readings, and a final assignment. The instructors will act as facilitators. Students will be expected to be take leadership in exchanging ideas with the speakers and instructors and contributing meaningfully to class discussions.

Individual Assignments: Summaries of Speaker Lecturer

For 10 of the 12 weeks students will be responsible for a 1or 2 page individual assignment based on readings, the material presented in the class by the speaker(s) and the discussion in the class. This submission should include 1. Summary of the key ideas the speaker presented in their lecture. 2. Links to assigned reading for the lecturer. 3. Links to ideas from previous lectures. Format: 1 to 2 pages single spaced Times New Roman 12-point font. Place name and student number in header. Margins 2.54 cms. References included in page limit. Assignment for each week is due 6 pm the Saturday following the Monday class. Assignments must be handed in on time through BrightSpace. Late assignments will be penalized as follows: Within the first 24 hours 10% grade reduction, within 48 hours 30% grade reduction, after which the assignment will not be accepted for grading.

First Short Group Assignment

Each group chooses a different organization/company within a sector and evaluates the company's sustainability policy. Your group must obtain permission from the instructors to ensure each group focuses on a different company and your company selection is suitable for the project. Your company selection will be part of your first deliverable. Your final submission (deliverable 2) should include:

1. A summary of what you found and how accessible this information is to the public; and 2. An evaluation of what the company is doing, and is that an authentic undertaking or is it "greenwashing"? Explain. Assignment length 5 pages plus appendices and illustrations. Assignment due by 10 am on due date.

Second Group Assignment – Term Project

The objective of this assignment is to design your ideal sustainable home and neighborhood then figure out what it offers in terms of sustainability metrics and how to market it based on these metrics and sustainability goals. Use the content from the speakers on housing development to complete this assignment. Assignment due by 10 am on due date. Presentation of key points by groups in final class.



Grading

The grading will be based on criteria such as (but not limited to) research, understanding of the assignment, applying course content, depth of analysis, creativity, professionalism, paper flow, referencing, grammar and effective group work for the group assignments.

Preparation and Participation

Each week instructors will provide readings on the topic to be presented by the week's guest speaker. Students are expected to read preparation material prior to class. Online class attendance through Zoom is expected each week. Students cannot achieve full participation grades if they miss classes. Students can participate through the chat or speaking up when appropriate, and through the online class forum in Brightspace. Students will be asked to turn their webcam on to create a class presence when the speaker is first introduced, when they are asking questions and when the speaker is wrapping up. The lecture will be recorded in audio version and uploaded to Brightspace.
