Course Calendar Description: The process, tools and techniques necessary to acquire, clean, and analyze text that has been generated on social platforms. Social network analysis, sentiment analysis, topic extraction, and co-occurrence analysis. Also offered at the undergraduate level, with different requirements, as BUSI 4408, for which additional credit is precluded.

Course Description: Tools for data analytics; analyzing data beyond statistics; data mining and predictive modeling; time series analysis and forecasting; neural networks algorithms in business analytics. Includes: Experiential Learning Activity.

Course Learning Objectives:

- 1. Gain understanding of basic data management and integration techniques.
- 2. Mining unstructured text data
- 3. Social Network analysis.

Course Prerequisites: N/A

Required Materials: SAS Studio and the SAS Viya platform will be used to complete assignments. It is highly recommended that students familiarize themselves with SAS as much as possible before the assignments are distributed. SAS offers a free e training called *Prog 1* that provides an overview of the SAS interfaces and introduces data manipulation techniques that will be used in this course. For assignments, the course will use the SAS environment provided by SAS online for Academics. Instructions on how to access this portal will be given on Brightspace.

Each component of your grade will be assigned a percentage score. Your final course grade will be a weighted average of each of these components.

- <u>Paper Review</u>: Students will choose from a list of journal papers on text mining and network analysis. Students will present a summary of each paper in a brief presentation.
- <u>Assignments:</u> Students will be given three assignments for completion before the beginning of class on the assigned date. Assignments must be submitted electronically before the start of the class on the dates indicated on the course outline. Failure to submit the assignments on time may result in the loss of marks. Students may work in groups to complete the assignments; however, each student must prepare and submit their own assignment.
- Midterm Quiz: A short multiple choice quiz will be delivered via Brightspace before the start of reading week.
- Final Exam: A final take home exam will be held during the regular scheduled exam period.

Late Assignments:

To ensure fairness for all students, penalties will be applied to late assignments: Failure to submit an assignment on time will result in an initial penalty of five (5) percentage points, followed by an additional (2) percentage points per day thereafter. The procedure is as follows: Each student should take 100 points and allocate those points to the various members of the group (including him/her/themself) to reflect the contributions made by each member. For instance, if there are four members in a group and everyone contributed equally, each individual would receive 25 points. Conversely, if an individual contributed relatively little, the remaining group members might allocate few points to that member. To ensure that these peer evaluation scores are reasonable and free from personal bias, you will be asked to provide a detailed written explanation for your point allocation.
