

Minor in Business for Bachelor of Engineers [4.0 credits]

This pamphlet is only a guide. Consult both your academic audit and the Carleton University Undergraduate Calendar (www.carleton.ca/cuuc) for specific rules that apply to your program.

Minor in Business for Bachelor of Engineering (MiB Eng): is an option designed for students registered in Engineering Undergraduate Honors programs. The Minor can be earned through successful completion of 4.0 credits specified in the table. On successful completion of all requirements, the designation “Minor in Business for Bachelor of Engineering” will be noted on the students transcript and diploma.

Eligibility for the Minor in Business for Bachelor of Engineering: Only students pursuing a Engineering Undergraduate program requiring at least 20.0 credits to graduate and who have completed a least 4.0 credits towards their degree, with a minimum overall CGPA of 7.0, may be admitted to the Minor in Business for Bachelor of Engineering.

Required Minor courses

[2.5 credits]:

BUSI 1003 - Survey of Accounting

BUSI 2121 - Intro. to Organization Behaviour
Prerequisites: 2nd year standing

BUSI 2204- Basic Marketing

BUSI 2301 - Intro. to Operations Management
Prerequisites: 2nd year standing; STAT 2606 (May be taken concurrently)

BUSI 2503 - Basic Finance for Non-Business Majors
Prerequisites: 2nd year standing

Please Note:

If you plan on taking two Minors in Business (e.g. the Minor in Business and the Minor in Entrepreneurship or the Minor in Arts Management) only 2.0 credits can double count between the two Minors.

Optional Minor courses:

1.5 credits from BUSI courses open to Minor students. Please refer to the Priority List available at sprott.carleton.ca/registration

*Students in some degree programs may not have sufficient “free” electives to complete the requirements for the MiB Eng beyond the specific credits designated for their degree. In such cases, students choosing to pursue the Minor option, will have to fulfill the requirements of the Minor over and above the requirements of their primary degree program.
